Dear Committee Members,

I would like to pass along to you some opinions from two perspectives if possible.

I have been the Program Team Leader of French and Transitions since 2008 and teaching exclusively in the French Immersion and Extended French Programs at Chippewa. I am also a parent of two secondary school students, both enrolled in the French Immersion Program.

As Program Team Leader of French, I would like to suggest very strongly that the history of French Immersion and Extended French is well-established at Chippewa (Immersion began here in 1982 and Extended followed shortly after. I was in the graduating class of 1989). In the 1990's the Near North Board decided to offer Extended French at two other sites outside of CSS and these programs were eventually grandfathered out due to lack of student retention, divided resources, divided staff and most importantly, lack of culture. When you keep Immersion and Extended (Programs I feel have been essential to the survival of the Near North District School Board, among others) together, in one setting, students support each other. We have enough students to run the ten (plus) credits necessary for the French Immersion Certificate. We have the resources and staff to support these students.

It is also essential, in my opinion, that French Immersion and Extended French remain at Chippewa, or on the CSS site. We have, as a 7-12 French Immersion and Extended French school, established an essential link with the French Immersion school beside us, Alliance. This relationship began long before FI students moved into Alliance but it became even stronger when the grade 7 and 8 students moved into CSS. Transitions at the grade 6-7 and 8-9 levels are very seamless and we have worked hard to use this geography to our students' advantage, particularly with respect to Student Success.

Finally, as a parent of French Immersion students, I feel that the Near North Board has, on some occasions, taken French Immersion and Extended French families for granted and assumed that families would remain loyal to the Near North Board through yet more drastic building and location change and subsequent upheaval. I have heard recently from many French Immersion and Extended French parents who have said that if the Immersion and/or Extended Programs moves to the WFSS site, they will remove their child and enroll that student at one of our neighbourhood catholic secondary schools, either the English (with Immersion) or the French (with French first language). I am very concerned about this.

Finally, I can appreciate the financial constraints under which the NNDSB currently functions. However, I am not, personally, in favour of a 3-1 option. As an educator, I feel that one large school will not sufficiently address the multiple needs of the clientele in this municipality. I do feel the best option is a 3-2 where French Immersion and Extended French remain at CSS and Arts Nipissing and ST-21 and Tech should be housed at a second location.
